ANNUAL IMPACT STATEMENT

Phoenix House Texas remains committed to our mission of helping youth, families, and communities proactively build the skills and supports needed to live substance-free, healthy lives. Our work has never been more important, as Mental Health America ranks Texas 50th in the nation for access to mental health care, and the most recent National Survey on Drug Use and Health reports that **48.4 million Americans age 12 and older had a substance use disorder in 2024**—a figure that has remained steady since **2021**.

Throughout the last year, we continued to expand the reach of our Positive Prevention programming across Texas. Strong partnerships have been critically important to increase our impact. For example, we partnered with the City of Dallas to deliver additional substance use prevention and mental health education in Southwestern Dallas, and we ultimately expanded our total reach in Dallas County by **329%**. In Austin, we continued key partnerships, such as Transformative Youth Justice, and built new community connections, helping increase our reach by **238%**. In Houston, we increased our reach by **63%**, and we expanded the types of services we provide by operating the Region 6 Prevention Resource Center. Our Project Empathy initiative has also grown, educating over 4,000 participants since its inception in 2023 and fighting stigma not only in Texas, but nationally from coast to coast.

Thank you for supporting our mission. Together, we are creating safer, healthier futures for youth and families throughout Texas.

Compared to the previous program year, we increased our reach in Harris County by **63%**.




